Dear Senator Murray:

We write to you as businesses and community organizations that understand the importance of transportation to the vitality of communities across the State of Washington. COVID-19 has stressed our transit systems and services and underscored the importance of maintaining a resilient, multimodal transportation system that is built for the long term.

As organizations with footprints in Seattle – including Uptown, South Lake Union, and Denny Triangle through Downtown and South Downtown neighborhoods – we have successfully worked with local, state, and federal agencies to make substantial investments in our transportation network. These efforts have helped to fuel unprecedented economic growth and job creation throughout the region. We believe federal stimulus investments made during the last recession, which provided the final push needed to modernize Mercer Street, have been particularly impactful.

Today, we encourage you to prioritize the following projects to accelerate the COVID-19 recovery, allow greater mobility for all of our citizens, and promote sustained economic growth:

- **Sound Transit 3** COVID impacts are imperiling the on-time delivery of the much-needed Westlake, Denny, South Lake Union, and Seattle Center stations.
- SR 520/I-5 Express Lanes This Washington State Department of Transportation project, which would connect express lanes on SR 520 and I-5 to Mercer Street, was set to begin construction in 2020. The project faces an uncertain future due to the passage of I-976 and COVID-19 budget shortfalls.
- Inter-neighborhood connections Transit connections that link Seattle's urban centers are
  critical to returning people to work and rebuilding the economy. This should include RapidRide
  projects that will provide frequent all-day transit service; the Center City Connector, linking
  Seattle's two streetcar lines through the downtown core; and the Seattle Monorail, which is a
  critical transit connection between downtown transit hubs and the Seattle Center. The West
  Seattle Bridge must also be repaired or replaced.

Also, thank you for passage of the CARES ACT, which provides critical emergency funding for public transit agencies hit hard by COVID-19. We know that continued system and service investments are needed to address the current crisis and ensure long-lasting capacity.

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We appreciate your ongoing support for funding that meets the transportation needs of Washington residents, community organizations, and businesses.
